<u>Subject</u>: Publication of Open Season Results for Line 6902 in the Imperial Valley and Line 7000 in the San Joaquin Valley

Southern California Gas Company ("SoCalGas") hereby submits for filing with the California Public Utilities Commission ("Commission") this publication of the results of the Open Season held for firm service contracts commencing April 1, 2007 for both Line 6902 in the Imperial Valley and the Line 7000 in the San Joaquin Valley.

<u>Purpose</u>

This filing submits for publication the results of the above mentioned Open Season pursuant to CPUC Decision 06-09-039 which requires SoCalGas to hold an Open Season in areas that are constrained or expected to soon be constrained and to publicize the results, as stated on page 61 of the decision:

"We will require that SoCalGas and SDG&E hold open seasons for firm capacity over those segments of the local transmission system which are experiencing or are expected to soon experience congestion, and that they publicize the results...If nominations exceed the available capacity, then our expectation is that the utility will promptly upgrade the system. If, even in the event that nominations exceed capacity, the utility declines to upgrade the system, it shall file a publicly available advice letter with the Commission explaining its decision."

Background

SoCalGas has determined that the Imperial Valley and San Joaquin Valley are areas that are potentially constrained. SoCalGas has conducted Open Seasons in both areas in 2003 and 2005. The 2007 Open Season was held for firm service contracts commencing on April 1, 2007.

Large customers were asked to bid their desired firm service requirements for five years, and the smaller customers were asked to bid for a two-year term. All firm service requests were subject to use-or-pay obligations.

San Joaquin Valley Open Season Results

SoCalGas sent bid packages to the 124 customers currently noncore, noncore eligible, or expected to be noncore eligible within the term of this Open Season. Forty-four customers bid for firm noncore service, 28 elected core service, and 52 elected interruptible noncore service. Two of the firm customers were large customers and therefore were required to bid a five-year term.

SoCalGas was able to award all customer bids for firm noncore service. It should be noted that some noncore customers within the San Joaquin Valley constrained area elected interruptible service. There is still a risk of interruptible service curtailment if these interruptible customers operate on a cold winter day.

The existing infrastructure is adequate to supply all core and firm noncore requirements and no expansions are planned at this time. Based on these results, in accordance with Special Condition 34 of the GT-F tariff, if the Commission agrees that no expansion is needed, SoCalGas will reduce the commitment for the SJV large customers from five years to two years, consistent with the term for small customers. Schedule GT-F Special Condition 34 states as follows:

<u>Term</u>: For large noncore customers, the term for firm service shall be the earlier of (a) two (2) years beyond the in-service date of facilities associated with the expansion of local transmission service or (b) five (5) years. For small noncore customers, the term is two years. In the event all requests for firm noncore capacity can be awarded without proration and the Utility does not plan to expand the local transmission system within the five-year contract period, the Utility will inform the Commission. **Upon Commission agreement that there is no need to construct additional facilities within the five-year contract period, the Utility shall amend the five-year contracts to expire after two years, consistent with the term for small customers. (emphasis added)**

Current capacity in the San Joaquin Valley is 180 MMcfd. Peak firm demand (core 1 in 10 cold day demand plus noncore firm bids) is 158 MMcfd, leaving excess capacity of 22 MMcfd. Based on these results and SoCalGas' analysis of likely firm demand, SoCalGas has determined no additional facilities are needed at this time.

Imperial Valley Open Season Results

SoCalGas sent bid packages to 13 customers, who are currently noncore, noncore eligible, or expected to be noncore eligible within the term of this Open Season. Four customers bid for firm noncore service, six elected core service, two elected interruptible noncore service and one customer elected to amend the terms of its long term transportation contract (LTK). One of the firm customers was a large customer, and thus was required to bid a five-year term.

SoCalGas was required to prorate the one large customer's award, because firm noncore bids exceeded the available capacity for the constrained area. This customer experienced prorations of approximately 14% in 2007, 22% in 2008, and 36% in 2012.

One customer had an existing long term transportation contract. Capacity was set aside to cover their contract quantities.

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One customer, whose recently executed 15-year LTK is pending approval at the CPUC, was awarded a two-year firm service contract for less capacity than requested in the LTK. The difference was set aside pending approval of the LTK by the CPUC. Another customer, who is currently taking service under an LTK expiring in 2010, elected to reduce its contracted capacity to more closely match its actual historical usage, which also had the effect of making it eligible to bid as a small customer for a two-year term. The capacity released through this action, if and when approved by the CPUC (see SoCalGas Advice No. 3741), will be awarded to the one prorated customer.

Current capacity of the Imperial Valley system is now 86 MMcfd. The Imperial Valley is a summer peaking system. Summer firm demand (core load plus firm noncore bids) is forecast to exceed the hourly system capacity during peak hours by 10% in 2007, increasing to 30% in 2012. In order to meet expected firm demand during peak hours, SoCalGas will expand the Imperial Valley system.

Capacity Expansion

Based on the open season results and analysis of likely future demand, SoCalGas has determined that an expansion is necessary in the Imperial Valley. SoCalGas plans to install 22 miles of 24 inch pipe to loop Line 6902 north from El Centro toward Niland. This will add 64 MMcfd of additional capacity, increasing system capacity from 86 MMcfd to 150 MMcfd. This is sufficient to meet known and expected firm demand in the Imperial Valley for the next five to ten years.

Protest

Anyone may protest this Advice Letter to the Commission. The protest must state the grounds upon which it is based, including such items as financial and service impact, and should be submitted expeditiously. The protest must be made in writing and must be received within 20 days of the date this Advice Letter was filed with the Commission. There is no restriction on who may file a protest.
